# What Is Developmental Screening?

Developmental Screening is an easy way to pinpoint delays early and celebrate milestones. This is done by using a series of questions that a parent/caregiver can complete on their own or with the doctor. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that all children are developmentally screened during the well child visit at 9, 18, and 30 months of age and whenever a concern arises. Early childhood professionals, who have been trained, are able to provide these screenings.

A screening does **not** provide a diagnosis, rather, it tells you if your child is on track and helps you learn how to support your child's development. He/she might need some additional support, such as a referral to Early Supports and Services, Special Education or a specialist. Connecting with specialists and services early is an important next step to help you to support and meet your child's needs.

### Why Does Developmental Screening Matter?

- It's an important way to celebrate your child's development.
- Screenings help provide information when shared with your primary care doctor, childcare providers and others who might interact with your child.
- The sooner a developmental concern is identified the sooner families can get the supports they need to maximize their children's potential.
- To identify and address risk factors (e.g. medical, environmental, Adverse Childhood Experiences) that can change the brain's structure and impact health and normal growth patterns.

#### Intervening early can:

- Strengthen children and their families to allow them to be successful and independent.
- ♦ Help you learn what milestones to expect for your child.
- Decrease the number of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs).
- Decrease the need for long-term social service system supports.
- Prevent or minimize costly special education services

# **Developmental Screening Fact Sheet**

## What you can do as a parent:

- If you have any concerns about your child's development make sure you discuss it with your child's doctor immediately. They can provide a developmental screen.

# What do we hope to accomplish in New Hampshire?

- Reach More Children. Increase the number of children provided with a developmental screening.
- Connect Children With Supports and Services. Improve the referral and follow-up process to make sure families needs are being met.
- Increase Awareness. Increase community awareness of the importance of early developmental screening and the fact that healthy social and emotional development is important for all children.
- Provide families with education and resources from the Learn The Signs. Act Early.
